BRIEF PLANT DESCRIPTIONS

EVERGREEN TREES:

Douglas-fir is a common conifer in Western Washington. This fast growing tree is found in upland mixed stands with hemlock and cedar. It is tall with a deeply furrowed, corky brown bark, and its cone is papery with 3-pronged bracts. Produces cones. It is good for buffer zone or streamside plantings and does well in dry to moist sites with sun.

Port-Orford Cedar is a Northwest native that grows best under maritime conditions in either sun or partial shade. This evergreen conifer grows from 60-100 feet tall and up to 40' wide, and forms a narrow pyramidal tree with short upright branches and gentle weeping tips. Foliage consists of fern-like leaves in flattened sprays of blue-green needles with a spicy scent. These trees must have a well drained planting site and shelter from wind, and are best suited to larger landscapes.

Western Red Cedar is a native conifer with a tapering trunk found in a variety of habitats from dry uplands to swampy sites. This beautiful native can reach 120+ feet, and prefers moist soils and full or part shade. It has red, peeling bark and flattened scale-like needles. This tree produces small cones with woody scales.

DECIDUOUS TREES:

Cascara is a deciduous tree with small flowers, attractive fruit, and a gorgeous fall color. Both the flowers and fruit attract various wildlife. They attain a mature height of 30 and width of 15 feet, but sometimes remain as small shrubs in other climates. The Cascara tree can grow in both sun or shade and prefers moist, well drained sites. -W-

Oregon Ash is a medium sized tree commonly 40 to 80 feet tall and 1 to 3 feet in diameter, crown may be narrow or spreading. Bark is thin, smooth, and gray-green when young but eventually becoming up to 1 1/2 inches thick and furrowed with thin, flat ridges, gray-brown. Leaves are 5 to 14 inches long with 5 to 9 leaflets. Once established on site, Oregon ash provides food and habitat for beaver and nutria, which also significantly damage the trees. Deer and elk browse Oregon ash seedlings and stump sprouts. -W-

Pacific Willow is a vigorous, large shrub or small tree which can grow up to 30 feet tall. It thrives in moist soils in sun to shade, but will tolerate drier sites as well. It is perfect for stabilizing stream banks and provides great wildlife habitat. The deciduous leaves are long, narrow and glossy. -W-

Paper Birch is a medium-sized tree, up to 90 ft tall, with a pyramidal or irregular crown. The bark is smooth, thin, chalky-to-creamy white; peeling in horizontal papery strips. Paper Birch prefers moist soil and sun or part shade.

Quaking Aspen is a medium sized tree, up to 70 feet tall, with a smooth white trunk 1-2 feet in diameter. Leaves are rounded and shine bright green until they turn yellow in the fall. Two-inch catkins flower in very early spring, producing small narrow cones that split to release copious amounts of tiny, cottony seeds that are dispersed by the wind. Grows in a variety of soils in sun or part shade. -W-

Red Alder is broadleaf deciduous tree, growing generally 40-50 ft tall. They have a broadly conical shape with spreading branches when in the open and smooth, light gray bark. This nitrogen-fixing tree is tolerant of many inhospitable soil types, and tolerates poorly drained soils, but it is not a wet-site species. Best growth is on well-drained loam/silt loam soils in full sunlight.

Red Osier Dogwood is a multi-stemmed shrub that reaches up to 20 feet tall. Red Osier Dogwood needs moist or wet soil and will do well in sun or shade. The young stems are often bright red and round in cross-section. This is a great wildlife plant and is ideal for erosion control on wet sites. -W-

Vine Maple: is a multi-stemmed shrub that reaches 20 feet tall. It has small maple-like leaves that turn golden or bright-red (in full sun) in the fall. This plant grows well in moist to wet soils where it can receive some sunlight. It produces winged fruits that are eaten by squirrels and birds. This maple is also useful for erosion control and bank stabilization. -W-

SHRUBS:

Evergreen Huckleberry is an upright, evergreen, broad-leaved shrub up to 10 feet tall. This shrub grows in dry or moist soil and prefers part or full shade. Leaves are thick and leathery and persist year-round. Bluish-black edible berries are produced in late summer. Makes a great landscaping plant.. -W-

Gold Currant is deciduous shrub that grows 4 feet tall and about as wide. It has heart shaped yellow leaves which turn a beautiful chartreuse in summer, flower in winter, and become fruit in spring. A good source of nectar for hummingbirds and pollinators. This shrub prefers partial shade and is drought tolerant, but does require some extra summer watering. -W-

Indian Plum is a loosely branched deciduous shrub reaching heights of 10-15 feet at maturity. The bark is smooth and reddish brown. Leaves are 3-5 inches long, alternate and oblong and yellow in the late summer. This shrub flowers first in the spring, before leafing out. The flowers are white and trumpet shaped, hanging in clusters. The tiny plums appear in early to mid summer in clusters of 5-6 orange to dark purple fruits. This plant is among the favorites of birds. -W-

SHRUBS – continued

Mock Orange is a deciduous shrub that grows 10-30 feet tall and is widely found in the Pacific Northwest. It is popular in backyards because of the heavily scented creamy white flowers which bloom during the spring and early summer. This plant grows well in dry to moist soil, and full sun or part shade.

Pacific Ninebark is a dense growing shrub that may reach up to 12 feet. Ninebark needs moist or wet soils, and can grow in sun or shade. It has reddish peeling bark and 3-5 toothed lobed leaves. The terminal cluster of flowers develops into berries that are highly valued forage for wildlife. -W-

Red Flowering Currant grows 6-10 feet tall. Several brownish stems rise from the base and stand erect or lean among other stems in thickets. Does well in dry to moist soil in sun or part shade. Each grayish green leaf looks like a small, rounded maple leaf. Pale to bright pink flowers droop in luscious bunches at the tips of branches from March to June depending on the location. -W-

Salal is an evergreen shrub that can grow upright or along the ground from 6"-16" tall. It does well in dry or moist sites but prefers part or full shade. The leathery tough leaves are shiny dark green with fine toothed edges. It has small pink bell-shaped flowers and produces dark purple hairy berry. Grows best in forested habitats, but is also a nice landscaping plant. -W-

Serviceberry is a multiple-trunked shrub 15-25 feet tall, with dense, fine-textured branching. This plant will grow in dry to moist soils in sun or shade. White flowers occur in terminal clusters before the leaves appear and are followed by summer berries turning from red to purple or nearly black. A food source for many birds and small mammals. -W-

Sword Fern is a hearty evergreen shrub that can grow to 4 feet tall, with erect leathery, shiny dark green fronds that can be 2-4 feet long. Grows in most conditions, but thrives best in forested areas where there is shade to part sun. Makes a great landscaping plant.

Tall Oregon Grape is an erect evergreen shrub that reaches 3-10 feet tall. Tolerates a range of soils, from dry to moist, and sun or shade. The leaflets are dark glossy green and paler green below. The plant has yellow flowers, and later bears dark blue, sour berries that are edible. Makes a nice landscaping plant. -W-

Thimbleberry is a very dense shrub and can grow up to 2.5 m tall in height and spread as wide as its rhizome roots allow. The green upper side and pale below leaves are large and simple. Foliage turns a deep orange in the fall. The stems have no thorns, and can develop from buds as well as shoots straight from the ground. The shrub is a rapid grower and starts to flower and fruit within the second year of being planted. Flowers are white or pink and are usually found in clusters of two to six. The pink to red fruit is edible. -W-

Twinberry is an upright deciduous shrub that grows to about 10 feet in height. Twinberry prefers moist soil in sun or shade. The leaves are opposite, simple and ovate, 2-5 inches long. They are green and smooth above and below. The flower is small and tubular or trumpet shaped. The fruit appears in late summer and is dark purple and about 1/4 inch in diameter. Great for wildlife. -W-

GROUND COVERS:

Bunchberry is a low, perennial growing only 2-8" in height. Flowers are similar to the Pacific dogwood flower, on a smaller scale. They are born in tiny white clusters, surrounded by large white bracts, giving the appearance of a single blossom. Each flower has highly elastic petals that flip backward, releasing springy filaments that are cocked underneath the petals. The fruit is a coral red drupe that is edible with a mild flavor, similar to an apple. Fruit matures in late summer. -W-

Common Camas is a perennial groundcover that reaches 1ft. in height and produces a beautiful spring bloom of bluish purple flower clusters. A non-woody member of the Lilly family, Camas will tolerate both moist to dry soils and enjoys full sun to partial shade. Long narrow grass like leaves sprout from an edible bulb that will spread once established. The clusters of star-shaped blue flowers will come back spring after spring, offering nectar to butterflies and hummingbirds. -W-

Chocolate Lily is a perennial groundcover that reaches 3 ft. in height and is considered one of our more rare and beautiful wildflowers! Produces drooping bell-shaped flowers ranging from bronze to purple brown in color. Leaves sprout from a bulb in whorls of 3-5 lance-shaped leaves along the single stem. Tolerates moist to dry sites and full sun to partial shade.

Coastal Strawberry is an evergreen plant growing up to 10 inches in height, with glossy green 3 lobed leaves. The flowers are white, appearing in spring and early summer. Coastal strawberry has large, tasty, edible fruit that is red on the surface and white on the inside. It is one of two species of strawberry hybridized to create the modern garden strawberry. Tolerates full to partial sun and will spread, forming a thick glossy groundcover. -W-

Kinnikinnick grows to a length of 12 feet but rarely gets more than 8 inches above the ground. It has small evergreen leaves and small drooping bell-shaped flowers. Fruits are small red berries that remain on the plant into the winter. It prefers well drained soils, low summer moisture, and full sun. -W-

Plants marked with a "-W-" are great sources of food and shelter for wildlife!
