- Discussion of <u>NACD Pacific region elections</u> and plan a meeting for region elections NACD Pacific Region special elections zoom meeting to be scheduled for December. Executive committee representative, chair and vice-chair are up for election.
- Update on NACD grant opportunities.
 - 1. Friends of NACD grant (up to \$2,500) still available. Applications due by November 30.
 - 2. Urban and community grants upcoming this fall. \$50,000 for smallish urban project.
 - 3. TA grants coming in the spring of 2021.
- Update on NACD's Diversity, Equity, Inclusion (DEI) activities
 - 1. NACD has a DEI task Force. Meetings every Monday to create a resources tool kit for state associations and CDs. Report being developed including recommendations. Survey was done asking what districts need informed the task force direction.
 - 2. DRAFT report tentatively at 2021 annual meeting.
 - 3. Not starting from scratch. A group of people trying to do the right thing.
- ❖ The <u>2021 Annual Meeting</u> will be held online Feb. 1-10 through NACD's virtual meeting hub and will celebrate the theme "NACD's 75th Anniversary: A Diamond out of the Dust". Should be a broader audience and increased understanding for conservation. Likely a Zoom platform.
 - Fee structure not yet worked out. Have engaged a professional meeting company. Want to get a price point where lots of folks can participate. Staff, partners along with 17,000 CD officials should make for an expanded annual and 75th Meeting.
 - 2. By-Law Discussions at 2021 NACD Annual Meeting to cover 3 by-laws: 1) reorganization of by-laws in correct order, 2) Affiliate membership (section 13), 3) Finalization of budget process.
 - 3. Attempting to minimize time zone issues. Intend to space out meetings to minimize zoom burnout. https://www.nacdnet.org/news-and-events/annual-meeting/

Grant Funding Information

The Ecology draft offer list should come out January 15, 2021. That list will assume normal funding levels, but we really won't know for sure until June after the state budget passes. There will be no Terry Husseman Account grants in 2021 due to a lack of funds in the account. Other funding opportunities are listed on the last page of Project Development Resources. This includes Washington Water and Salmon Fund Finder, a grant and loan search tool with 63 natural resource funding opportunities in Washington. <u>Shellfish Protection Efforts in South Puget Sound</u>

Ecology nonpoint water quality specialists work together with local partners, such as Shellfish Protection districts and Pollution Identification and Correction groups, to identify and correct pollution sources affecting shellfish growing areas. Within several focus areas in the South Puget Sound, staff assess site conditions and use water quality data to identify existing and potential sources of bacteria that are discharging to state waters. Once pollution sources are identified, we work with property owners, agriculture operators and local partners to find solutions that will improve water quality to protect public health and recreational uses.

Soon, we will add a new Minter Bay Shellfish Protection District in Pierce County to our focused areas. We will support our local partners in carrying out the investigative that is currently under development. Our goal is to protect and restore waters to sustain healthy watersheds, important shellfish growing areas and their communities.

Staff Highlights

- In October, I completed a farm plan for a landowner in the Nisqually watershed. My last day at TCD was October 22, 2020. I will miss everyone dearly!
- This month, I was able to coordinate a group site visit, including TCD Staff and Marty Chaney from NRCS to visit multiple landowners whose land and pasture were affected by the Bourdeaux-Mima Rd fire, which burned nearly 300 acres in September. It was really meaningful to connect with and provide technical assistance to those who were most affected.
- The engineer signed off on Stout's C/S project, and it is great to see that Waste Storage Facility complete and already in use! One of the landowners I worked with signed a new cost share project to improve water quality for shellfish. I was able to participate in technical assistance site visits with a NRCS employee to help two different landowners renovate their pastures after a wildfire.
- I have completed or assisted with 15 live and pre-recorded Water Quality Zoom sessions with classes across Olympia, North Thurston, and Tumwater school districts. I also submitted two grant applications, seeking funding for new TCD volunteer initiative and materials for virtual programming.
